




WHY LONG FORM NONFICTION?






- Sherri is passionate about chocolate chip cookies




Created by making copies of book pages students then use a marker to isolate then piece together single words or short phrases from these texts to create lyrical masterpieces.




Emmett Till (1941-1955)



"We want to see the boy from Chicago." Those were the words of two white men who showed up in the middle of the night at a house in Mississippi. They were looking for four-teen-year-old Emmett Till. Emmett was a sweet-faced Black kid who loved to tell jokes. In the summer of 1955, Emmett traveled to Mississippi to visit relatives. His mother had not wanted him to go. Chicago had its race problems. But the South was particularly dangerous for Black boys.

On the night of August 24, Emmett and his cousins went into Bryant's Grocery and Meat Market in Money, Mis-

MENTOR TEXTS
